## Summer Camp 2014 from Trials to Joy

### From Kerline Jules, our Director in Haiti:

Greetings dear brothers and sisters in Christ!!!

#### To God be all the glory!

**This year I was very pessimistic about the summer camp** because of the chickungunya fever (see page 4, prayer requests) all around the country. I was extremely worried about taking the children to an area where the fever was affecting most of the people. I was wondering if I take the children and the whole crew (cooks and other leaders) to the camp and they become sick, would I be able to manage that crisis? My motivation was not in it at all. I decided to have the coordinators give me their input about having the summer camp or not this year. Fortunately, everyone said to me, it would be a good idea to have it done because all the children are waiting for the date, time and place. I agreed with them and it was a joyful decision for all of us.

After we decided to move forward, I started to face many bumps on the way. The first day of the camp was planned for July 23rd at 7:00 AM. On July 22nd around 2:00 PM the administrator of the camp site refused to let me come the next morning to start the program with the children. I don't have to tell you how devastated I was after receiving that awful news.

*I started making calls all over to find a place that was available*. Guess what? Around 4:00 PM on that same day God opened another door. I found another site. I have to tell you how helpful Lorkendia (a graduate of Rescue One who helps with the program) was. She was the leader and the messenger all at once; it took her two hours to do it all. She went to visit the whole place and communicated with me via telephone while on the site to assure me the place was acceptable to start the camp the next day. I gave her the credit for helping to get this done safe and well. After the Lord, Lorkendia lead me to the right place this year so the children could have fun and learn all the great things the leaders prepared for the program. The leaders and I did not get all the great things we expected but we managed to have everything done. At 10:30 PM I was driving all over Leogane, looking for drinking water, electric cables, and cooking instruments to make it happen. Fortunately, I have great leaders



around me who gave all the support I've needed to make the camp a great success this year. I thank the great Almighty for them all! I'm grateful.

Students arrive at Summer Camp aboard colorful buses and converted pick-ups called tap-taps. Each school committee is responsible for the transportation of their students for the 1 1/2 - 2 hour trip to Leogone. After an enjoyable week at camp, students again board the tap-taps for the homeward journey. The theme of our summer camp this year was: "The Fear of the Lord," and we find our reference verse in Proverbs 8:13.



Our favorite activity of the Summer Camp is the Bible study. The topic of the study for the kids was on the theme "Knowing Christ." They learned the following verses: John 10:11, "I am the good shepherd ... John 6:35, "I am the bread of life ... and John 8:12, "I am the light of the world."

**Using our own sound system is a blessing.** God has been so good to provide a sound system through the Andreas family. Together we sang the English versions of the songs, "My Jesus, my Savior," and "Our God is an Awesome God."







I have learned from my personal experiences that most often difficulties bring with them great blessings. The Lord has given me an inner peace and I managed that difficulty with joy knowing that blessings will flow and I am convinced that the Holy Spirit has done a tremendous job in the lives of the youths and the kids through sessions of Bible studies, songs, handicraft activities, games, sports, mentoring moments with young people, food and training of all kinds. We educate our children to become impactful citizens, useful to themselves, their families and their communities. So we take into account their holistic development, we aim at all aspects of their lives. -KJ

#### HEALTH NEEDS

Since May, the **chikungunya virus** has been prevalent in Haiti. This virus, spread by mosquito, results in a sharp fever, headache, full-body rash and joint pain. The illness is rarely fatal but recovery usually takes about a week. Many Rescue One children (and adults) have been affected, some so severely that one coordinator wept when she saw one of the children.
