The program is led by our Director in Haiti and is carried out through five churches there. Each church has a committee, a coordinator, and a cook. RO has a sister board in Haiti, Fondation Michee. The Haitians raise funds for the program and perform many other tasks such as those listed below.

- Oversees the entire program
- Evaluates reports from the churches
- Supervises daily activities
- Plans Summer Camp
- Plans the annual leaders' meeting
- Trains the leaders
- Prepares the estimated budget

Church Committees

- Supervise the work of the coordinator
- Make important decisions about the children, working closely with the Director for the wellbeing of the children
- Prepare progress reports

The Coordinator

- Visits the children and their parents
- Buys the school uniforms, books, and other supplies
- Makes the school payments
- Organizes spiritual and social events, like Bible study, Christmas parties, picnics
- Monitors and follows-up with sick children
- Coordinates the feeding program





Early in the morning the cooks search the crowded market place for the vegetables, cereals, spices, and oils needed

for the daily meal. They cook over large, steaming pots, then distribute the food to the children. Their day does not end until 3PM.

Meet Hulda



Twelve-year-old Hulda has been a part of the Rescue One program for seven years and is now in the seventh grade. She is the sixth in a family of twelve children. Neither parent has a stable job although the mother sells candy on the street. That income is inadequate for a family of fourteen and the family survives with the help of

others. The family lives in a very dangerous neighborhood called "ti Bwa" where there is periodic gang activity.

Hulda's mother suffers from sickle cell anemia and the church committee is having Hulda tested to see if she has the condition. During the chikungunya fever outbreak, Hulda was the sickest of the 17 Bolosse students who

became ill. After fifteen days in bed, Hulda tried to return to school in order to take the official government exams so that she would not fail. Unfortunately, she could not stay in class. Her condition worsened; she trembled and had trouble breathing.

Hilda's illness made it impossible for her to come to the church for her daily meal, which made her even weaker. The coordinator cried when she saw how ill Hulda was. She took Hulda to the clinic for medical attention.

Hulda has now recovered, is doing well, and has passed her exams.
