
Or from stories like this: In August, Kerline was visiting us in the USA and we took her to a local benefit event. Since she would know no one, I was praying it would be a pleasant experience for her. Not to worry, God had gone ahead of us. A gentleman engaged her at length about Haiti. Also bringing me deep gladness are the unique elements of our program:

- Children remain in their homes rather than in orphanages.
- Local Haitians are invested in the work and in the finances of the program. They share the costs of the school programs, the Summer Camp, the Christmas party and all related expenses.
- Students are graduating from the program and are becoming gainfully employed. (See accompanying article.) Some return to help in the RO program in areas such as Summer Camp.
- The program is run by dedicated, capable Christian Haitians under the able direction of Kerline.

THANK YOU for sharing in this work with us. May God give you deep gladness as you help us alleviate a small bit of the world's hunger. All the good that you will do will not come from you but from the fact that you have allowed yourself, in the obedience of faith, to be used by God's love.

J—completed a course in stone tile flooring, received his tools from the program and is off to work.

D—studied electrical wiring for homes, received his tools from the program, and is off to work.


Your gifts enable these students to complete school and to attain gainful employment.
