Meet Joseph

High on a hill facing the blue of the Caribbean Sea and overlooking the slums of Port-au-Prince is the Bolosse Church and the Maranatha School. This church was one of the first churches in the Rescue One program. Today the neighborhood has deteriorated and become very dangerous but our faithful partners there do their best to maintain the program.

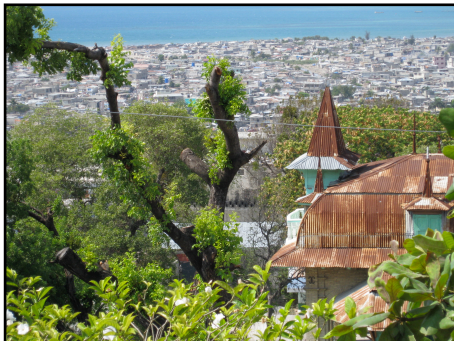


Joseph is a 12-year-old sixth grader in this program. His parents and 3 siblings have lived in a slum near the church where gangs fight from time to time in front of their home. The sounds of gunshots and the sight of heavy weapons traumatized Joseph but his family could not afford to leave and rent elsewhere.

When Covid 19 came to Haiti, the parents took the family back to the countryside where they originally lived. While they were gone, gangs set fire to their small dwelling and the family lost everything they owned. Despite being out in the countryside, the parents came each month to pick up the food sack that Rescue One provided.

Joseph loves the RO program and when he heard that school was about to resume, he begged his parents to return to the city. And that is what they did. At this time, Joseph and his mother are staying temporarily in someone else's home so that he can attend school. The zone is dangerous but his parents do not want Joseph to miss school.

Joseph is extremely grateful for the Rescue One program. He and his parents constantly call the coordinator to thank her.

Covid 19 and Life in Haiti

As this newsletter is being written, Covid has not had as severe an effect in Haiti as predicted. This is surprising because most citizens cannot isolate. They live in crowded conditions and must sell their wares and shop for necessities in crowded market areas.

The Haitian staff of Rescue One has been using phone contact rather than personal visits with the families of the students. They are educating the families on the best ways to protect themselves. Thus far, none of our students has been ill with the virus.

Schools have resumed. Students are wearing masks and we pray that it will not be necessary to interrupt their education again. The months of August, September and October will be considered the last semester of the 2019-2020 school year. The 2020-2021 year will start in November.
